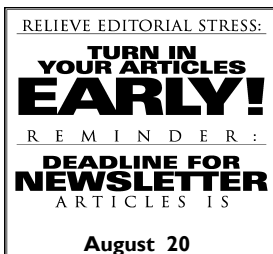

He (Jesus) said to him, “You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind.” Matthew 22:37

In 1529 when he was faced with church members who did not know what they believed and clergy who were doing an inadequate job of guiding people in their faith Martin Luther wrote what we know as The Small Catechism. It was provided as an instruction manual to help guide believers in their faith journey. The first part of this manual is the 10 Commandments.

To some these commandments are seen as the 10 restrictions. Understood like this the commandments seem designed to be like a wall or fence to keep or protect a person from different temptations or dangers to themselves or the relationship they have with God and others. The problem is that what a person is told they cannot have or are restricted from is precisely what is desired most.

This was the result of the serpent’s question posed to Eve when she was asked if God had told them they could not eat from ANY tree in the garden. The serpent stretched what God had said to include any fruit bearing tree in the garden and Eve stretched the understanding to even touching the fruit of the two trees declared off limits by God. What God had intended to be a means of promoting, sustaining and maintaining trust, life and relationship had just been undone.

To others these same commandments have been thought of as the 10 “freedoms.” Looking at them in this fashion meshes well with the word of God through the prophet Jeremiah. In Jeremiah 31 the prophet speaks of God’s etching or engraving the law on the hearts of people so that life and relationship is shaped by rather than constrained by the commandments.

Seen in this light the first three commandments help focus, sustain and strengthen the relationship between a person and God. They help us see past the distractions the world would offer as alternatives to God.

The verse at the beginning of this article was Jesus’ response to a question posed by a lawyer. This commandment Jesus called the first and greatest commandment. It summarized the first three of the ten freedoms.

In similar fashion the remaining seven commandments do the same for the relationships between people. Just as the first three set the stage as they help build a healthy relationship between a believer and God, the last seven help build, sustain and maintain healthy relationships between people. Jesus summarized these as he two verses later shared with the lawyer, **“An a second is like it: ‘You shall love your neighbor as yourself.’” (Matthew 22:39)**

Over the course of the next couple months I would encourage you to take the edition of The Small Catechism you are most familiar with and reflect on these 10 freedoms along with your devotions. As you do you may use these two questions or others like them to help in your reflection.

How do(does) these(this) commandment(s) help shape my relationship with God?

How do(does) these(this) commandment(s) help shape my relationship with others?

If you cannot find or may never have received a copy of The Small Catechism by Martin Luther, come see me and I will provide you with one.

Our Savior's Lutheran Church
Council Meeting Minutes
May 16th, 2011

Prior to the May Council Meeting members of the council met with Mike Novacek, Emily Swope, Heather Goroski, and Pastor Dave for yearly evaluations.

The May 16th OSL Council Meeting was called to order by President Nick Johnson in the church lounge.

Pastor Dave, Nick Johnson, Rachel Roggenbuck, Karen Rittmann, Kairouan Porter, and Carol Anderson were in attendance along with Treasurer Emily Swope. Ilene Estabrook Janice Grochow, Dean Maruska, and Jason Clark were absent.

Treasurer Emily Swope presented the treasurer's report. She shared that April had been a better month financially. She told that five members have signed up for Simply Giving and one person increased their amount. The insurance bills have arrived. The church insurance is \$6536 and the Workmen's Comp bill is \$1,074. Karen Rittmann motioned and Kairouan Porter seconded the motion that 1/6 of the church insurance and 1/2 of the workmen's comp bill be paid now and also that this report will be filed for audit.

Pastor Dave led us in prayer in place of devotions.

Rachel Roggenbuck motioned and Karen Rittmann seconded that we accept minutes of the April 18th meeting as printed.

Pastor Dave reported that he had done 10 nursing home/shut in visits, 4 private communions, 3 hospital visits, and 3 community member's visits. He met 4 times with the First Communion Class, met 2 times with New Member Classes, had 2 funerals, and attended the synod assembly.

Oral Communications:

Rachel Roggenbuck motioned and Karen Rittmann seconded that we contribute \$100.00 to the Prison Book Project from the mission fund.

Pastor read a communication from Dave Anderson thanking OSL for hosting his concert on May 6th and telling about The Shepherd's Canyon Retreat Center that will be built in AZ.

Committee Reports:

Stewardship and Missions- Nick reported that the North and South signs are a GO and will be installed before long. The committee is hoping that they are close to securing spots for the east and west signs too. Jim Folz has volunteered to continue to assist with this project.

Worship & Evangelism: Communion Servers for June 5th will be Rachel Roggenbuck and Karen Rittmann. Communion will also be on June 19th and July 3rd and 17th. The directories arrived and people see very pleased and excited about the finished product. The special talents have been well received and are being continued.. Lawn Chair Sunday will be on June 12th followed by a potluck and that grills will be provided-- people are welcome to bring their meat and cook it on the grills. Plates, silverware, cups and coffee will be provided. The VBS students will provide music that day.

There was concern about the white altar cloth that had

black wax all over it along with the same wax that was in the sacristy. It was determined that the "sniffers" were used at Christmas time for the wax candles and that a buildup of wax gathered inside. The oil candles have been having some problem keeping a good flame lately and it had been suggested that they hold the "bell" down tight over the candle. The result of this is the black drops of wax. It was decided to keep the old "bell" sniffers for any time when wax candles might be used— Christmas, candlelight, weddings, etc. Pastor Dave told about a new type of sniffer that is used for oil candles and a shot of air puts the candle out. Rachel Roggenbuck motioned and Kairouan Porter seconded to purchase two of these with memorial money.

Education and Youth: VBS will be June 6-9 from 6:00-8:30 with Karen Rittmann in charge. Mylo Carlson will do an adult class during that time. Sunday School ended on May 8th. Leanne Novacek has volunteered to be SS Superintendent for the coming year.

Property and Management: Karen Rittmann reported that Wayne Larson will replace the narthex door with a window and glass block will be put in the bottom part. It has been suggested that a long downspout be put on in that area to help drain all water away from the building. There is a tree in the parsonage yard that needs to be removed as it has a blight and is dying. Pastor told about the problem with a light switch in the parsonage. An electrician will be asked to check it out.

At this point in the meeting our time was up, so Rachel Roggenbuck moved and Kairouan Porter seconded to extend the meeting for 30 minutes.

OLD BUSINESS:

Kairouan Porter has made contact with people that had indicated they would serve on the Staff Support Committee. Initially the meeting was to be on May 22nd, but too many people are going to be away. It will be rescheduled. Thus far Linda Conely, Bev Duckstad, Ron Leverington, Linda Hamrick, and Jody Gulden have agreed to serve. Jeanie Ulferts will meet with them the first time.

Pastor Dave and Rachel Roggenbuck updated the group on the RERooting workshop that they attended a few months ago. The vision is to identify a simple path and move forward. The goal for this year is to revitalize our church.

Carol Anderson expressed thoughts and concerns on how we as a council aren't following through with items especially in light of the responsibility we took on and agreed to, when our respective council terms started. There are several projects that have been on our agenda for various lengths of time. In an effort to complete projects in a more timely manner, we will be reminding each other of our responsibility to our church family as we serve them as a council team. We will also be compiling a revolving list of duties/tasks to help ensure something isn't overlooked.

We closed with the Lord's Prayer.
The next meeting will be June 20th at 7:00.

We are afflicted in every way, but not crushed; perplexed but not driven to despair; persecuted but not forsaken; struck down but not destroyed (2 Corinthians 4:8-9).

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Our hearts have been breaking for weeks as we have watched incessant storms devastate many parts of the United States. From the plains of North Dakota to the bayous of Louisiana, floodwaters and torrential rain have washed out communities and cropland. Destructive tornado strikes leveled homes for miles in cities and towns including Joplin, Mo., and Cullman, Ala. Two ELCA church buildings -- one in each state -- were destroyed.

The winds destroyed the building of Peace Lutheran Church in Joplin, but not the faith of its members. Last Sunday they gathered in the parking lot in the midst of debris and shattered hopes to worship in the strong name of the risen Christ.

In the aftermath of storms that seem relentless, we may feel overwhelmed and anxious, but not powerless. For God's promise is clear: nothing in all creation will separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus. Trusting in God's promise and the power of the Holy Spirit, we respond by joining together in God's work of restoring community. The liberating power of the gospel frees us to repair roofs in Cullman and fill sandbags in Fargo, on behalf of people we don't know and may never meet.

These are our commitments as the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America:

- **We will pray.** Pray with me that those affected may have the strength and courage they need to face these difficult days.
- **We will stand together,** roll up our sleeves and work with partners to rebuild lives and restore hope. In Alabama, we are already at work with the Mennonites and the Chris-

tian Reformed Church in a rapid rebuilding project. Elsewhere, partnerships are unfolding with the United Methodist Church and others to coordinate volunteers to repair and rebuild homes and lives in the months and years to come. Working together we can achieve more on a scale and scope than we could ever achieve alone.

We will give generously. We are already organizing volunteer opportunities in response to the unmet needs of these communities. To support our efforts, please give now to [ELCA Disaster Response](#). Your gift designated to Severe Spring Storms will be used in full -- 100 percent -- for the people and communities deeply affected by these storms.

We will stay until the work is done. One of our strengths as Lutherans is our practice of sustained response after a natural disaster, built on local networks of congregations and social ministries. Central States Synod Bishop Gerald Mansholt compared our work to long-distance running. [ELCA Disaster Response](#) was one of the first to arrive in Missouri and Alabama, and they will be the last to leave. Even as we begin this journey, our work continues on the Gulf Coast and in Haiti.

- **We will witness to our living faith** in Christ Jesus as we join together to do God's work with our hands. In all these things, I give thanks for each of you. May we be about God's healing and restoration in a time of despair. May we bring God's message of hope in the wake of spring storms.

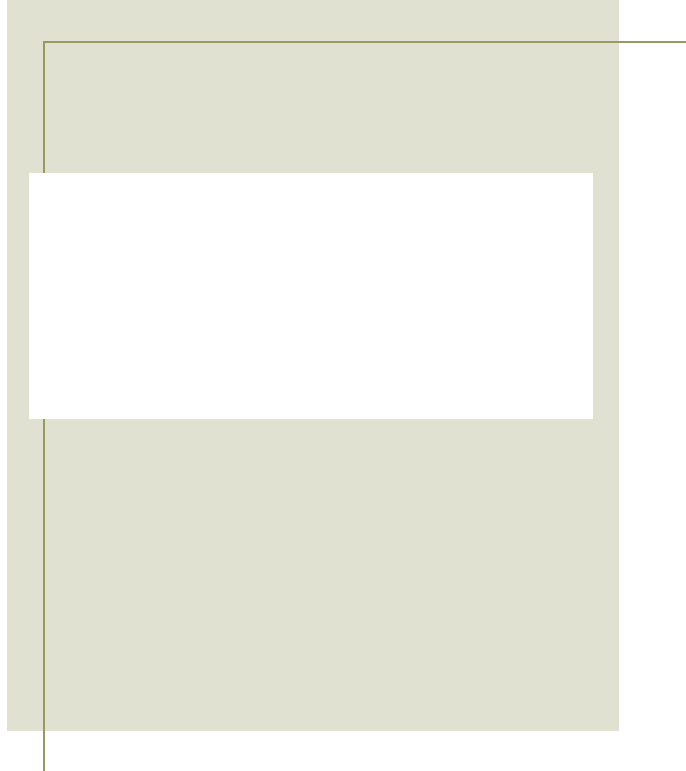
